

Describe any record evidence, monument evidence, testimonial evidence or any other material evidence you considered and whether the monument was found or restored through acceptance of an obliterated evidence location.

No bearing trees of record were located.

This corner is located on a large island formed by the Black River to the North and an old channel of the Black River to the South. This island is flooded each year during the Spring Floods.

The 3/4" iron shaft I found in 2012 is still in place with a new fence now erected to the North and South, which was not there in 2012.

Distances to the North and South match Wilhite's extremely well.

Older fences to the East across the channel match this location very well.

I accepted the location of the iron shaft as being the best available evidence of the original government corner and replaced it with a Harrison Monument.

Describe or show any material discrepancy between the location of the restored corner and that of the corner previously restored or re-established.

James D Turner established this corner in October 1847.

There is a supplemental plat for Section 10, drawn in May 1920. It states that it is meant to correct the acreage for Government Lot 3 and does not indicate any actual re-survey on the Section.

C M Keach was at this corner, in Feb 1910, during a survey in Section 10. He shows that he set an iron stake at this corner.

Dallas Wilhite was at this corner, in April 2007, during a survey in Section 3 and Section 10. He shows that he set a Harrison Monument at this corner.

I was at this corner, in August 2012, during a survey in Section 11. I found a 3/4" shaft with a 1/4" nut attached to the top at the location computed from Wilhite's survey. I took this shaft to be Keach's iron stake.
